3Ls: Loan Repayment Assistance Program

If you have secured, or hope to secure, a postgraduate position with a non-profit organization or government agency with an annual salary of \$44,000 or less, you may qualify for a Loan Repayment Assistance Program (LRAP) Grant. Applications will be available in the Career Services Office on Tuesday, April 12, and **are due by Friday, May 7, 2011 at 12:00 p.m. (NOON)**.

PLEASE BE AWARE THAT YOU DO NOT NEED TO HAVE SECURED A POSITION WITH A NON-PROFIT OR GOVERNMENT AGENCY BY MAY 7! IN ORDER TO QUALIFY FOR A LOAN REPAYMENT ASSISTANCE GRANT, YOU ONLY NEED TO HAVE SECURED A QUALIFYING POSITION BY APRIL 1, 2012.

2Ls and 3Ls: Timeline for Judicial Clerkship Applications

If you will be applying for judicial clerkships that begin in 2012, you MUST stop by Career Services and pick up a document entitled "Checklist of Important Deadlines." This document contains the deadlines that are important in the judicial clerkship application process, some of which are mandatory internal deadlines. **The first such deadline is May 1, which is the date you must inform Career Services of your intent to apply for judicial clerkships and the names of your faculty recommenders.**

1Ls and 2Ls: Sign up to Attend a Career Services Orientation about Fall On-Campus and Off-Campus Recruiting Programs

On Monday, April 18, and Friday, April 22, the Career Services Office will present two identical orientation sessions for 1Ls and 2Ls who want to participate in our Fall 2011 on-campus interviewing program, or any of the many off-campus job fairs that will be occurring in August. Topics will include deadlines for the various job fairs; when to submit your resume and cover letter for review; when and how to bid for interviews with employers who

are participating in our on-campus interviewing program; how and when to apply to legal employers who are not participating in our on-campus interview program; etc.

Apply Now for Midwest Environmental Advocates' Fall 2011 Clinical Program Externship and Seminar

Midwest Environmental Advocates, an independent nonprofit environmental law firm, offers a unique experience for Wisconsin law students to get an in-depth look at all aspects of environmental law practice and nonprofit legal work.

MEA's clinical program includes two parts, the seminar and the externship. MEA's weekly seminars are intended to provide students with a varied and in-depth look at all aspects of the practice of environmental law. Seminars are taught by a combination of MEA's staff and outside experts, including some non-lawyers, who provide unique perspectives on environmental law.

Applications are being accepted NOW for Fall 2011. The final application deadline is April 15, 2010.

Students are awarded seven credits on a pass/fail basis for the semester, and commit to 315 hours of work, including the seminar. Weekly seminars are analogous to law school seminars and usually include readings.
