 - If fewer than 12 credits: UW Law Scholarship disbursement may be reduced or eliminated
 - If fewer than 6 credits: Federal loan deferment expires; grace period begins unless already used up.

 - faculty feedback on draft
 - final version incorporating feedback
- “LW eligible” courses should be confirmed w instructor for deadlines/special instructions
- Journal work must be reviewed and approved by faculty
- May NOT be met with same course, in same term as Experiential Learning Requirement
- Submit completed form when you've submitted your final work for review

Determining 60-Credit Rule



Supreme Court Rule 40.03

“All semester credits so certified shall have been earned in regular law school courses having as their primary and direct purpose the *study of rules and principles of substantive and procedural law as they may arise in the courts and administrative agencies of the United States and this state.*”

Advising & Curriculum

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Course Selection Strategies

- **The Essentials:** Take courses required for JD degree and Diploma Privilege. Pace yourself – you don't have to take them all at once!
- **Practice Specialization:** Focus on courses that align with a practice area of interest or curricular concentration
- **Build a Broad Foundation:** Keep your legal education well-rounded – take foundational courses in a variety of practice areas
- **Build Skills:** Include courses and clinics/externships that help build essential lawyering and professional skills
- **Plan for the Bar:** Consider integrating bar-tested subjects into your schedule throughout 2L and 3L years and plan to take Director Baldwin's Bar Prep course in 3L year
- **Sequence Your Learning:** Focus on foundational and prerequisite courses first and then map out the timing of upper-level, specialized courses
- **Enjoyed a Professor?** Take courses offered by instructors who have a teaching style that you like



Managing Your Workload

- **Balance the Load:**

- Students should average 15 credits/semester (14-16 credits is a good range)
- Try creating a schedule with a mix of doctrinal courses, skills-building, and co-curriculars (if applicable)

- **Mix Your Final Requirements:**

- Consider taking courses with a variety of final requirements (exams, papers, projects)

- **Check the Exam Schedule:**

- Try to avoid several back-to-back exams. **Fall exam dates pending**, but will be listed in the [Law School Course Schedule](#) before registration

- **Avoid Co-curricular Burnout:**

- Interested in co-curriculars? Focus on one, rather than doing them all!

- Up to six (6) credits of graduate level or foreign language course work may count towards 90 credits needed for JD, subject to conditions.
- Must have permission to receive credit, form available on [forms](#) page.
- Must receive a “B” or better.
- Does not factor into GPA, 64- or 60-credit rules



Pass/Fail Option ([Rule 2.03](#))

- 2 *elective* P/F classes allowed by Law School Rules
- Eligible courses are indicated in [Course Schedule](#) as “PF Option”
- Mandatory Pass/Fail are indicated as “PF Only” and do not count against elective limit

- A GPA of at least 3.5 (on the 4.3 scale) on those credits, at least 8 of which must be graded on the 4.3 scale
- Completion of the credits by the due date for turning in grades at the end of the semester in question
- Recorded on *official transcript*

Graduation & Beyond

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Graduating Early

- No more than 18 credits/semester
- May graduate “no earlier than 24 months”
- Notify Law School Registrar
- Meet with your OCPD Advisor
- Be aware of any deadlines for Diploma Privilege or out-of-state bar applications

Dean's Academic Achievement Award

- 3.5 GPA in penultimate semester
- Allows you to wear an honors stole at commencement

Graduation Honors: *Minimum of 45 graded credits*
30 graded credits for transfer students

- Cum laude - 3.5 to 3.74
- Magna cum laude - 3.75 to 3.94
- Summa cum laude - 3.95 and above



The Order of the Coif

A national honor scholastic society recognizing law students who attain a high grade of scholarship

- Top 10% of graduating class (no more than 15%)
 - December, May, & August grads constitute a “class”
- Requires 68 graded law credits
- FYI: 3.74 for 2024-25 – went to 15%
